

Foreword



Dear media representatives,

Welcome to a new season in the Women's EHF Champions League.

Four months after CSM Bucuresti completed their stunning Cinderella story, by claiming their maiden European crown in Budapest after beating Györ in the final's penalty shootout, we are ready to witness how a new handball fairy tale starts to unravel.

As we enter the 24th season of the competition, twelve matches in three qualification tournaments will determine which three teams will earn the remaining berths in the 2016/17 Group Matches. The tournaments will take place in three major countries in women's handball and I am sure we can look forward to large crowds in the Norwegian city of Drammen San Sebastian, Spain and the capital of Slovenia, Ljubljana.

What makes this year's qualification even more exciting is the fact that we have three former EHF Champions League winners eyeing the return to the European top flight and remain in the run for the Women's EHF FINAL4 on 13/14 May 2017.

Record four-time champions Hypo Niederösterreich, two-time trophy holders RK Krim Mercator and 1996 winners HC Podravka found themselves fighting for their spots in the group matches and undoubtedly will do their best to bring back their glory days in this competition.

Their mission is clear, but not at all easy as they face formidable adversaries. Podravka will have expectations to live up to in Group 1, where the Norwegian runners-up and tournament's organisers Glassverket are amongst their fiercest opponents. Arguably the most difficult road awaits Hypo. Even if they overcome the Group 2 hosts Super Amara Bera Bera in the semifinal, they still have to outrun the German runners-up from Leipzig, who are likely to reach the tournament's final at the expense of the newcomers HC Gomel. Krim will enjoy the home crowd's support but their task is not much easier as they face ambitious luventa Michalovce in the semi-final and should they make it to the decider, the Polish champions from Lublin might stand in their way as they face Indeco Conversano, another debutant.

In the group matches Buducnost, Thüringer HC and Metz await the winner of Group 1 from Drammen, while the winner of Group 2 in San Sebastian will join Vardar, Astrakhanochka and Ferencvaros and the Group 3 winners will enjoy a purely Scandinavian set of rivals in Larvik, Esbjerg and Sävehof.

There are twelve exciting matches ahead in this qualification phase and I wish all teams the very best of luck.

We pride ourselves on our positive and cooperative relationship with the press and media and I am sure this will continue and develop in the future. Important regulations

SCORING OF MATCHES AND RANKING

GENERAL

All matches of the WOMEN'S EHF Champions League shall be played in 2 x 30 minutes with a half-time break of 10 minutes.

The EHF reserves the right to extend the half-time break in special circumstances to 15 minutes.

QUALIFICATION TOURNAMENTS

If a semi-final match or the final (place 1/2) ends in a draw, there will be a five-minute break followed by one extra-time of 2x5 minutes, there will be a one-minute half-time break at the half-time for the changeover of teams. If the placement match (place 3/4) ends in a draw, there shall be no extra-time, the match will be decided directly by penalty throws. In the semifinals and/or final (place 1/2), if there is no winner after the extra-time, the match will be decided by penalty throws.

RULES FOR EXECUTION OF PENALTY THROWS

- Prior to penalty throwing, each team shall name five players eligible to play at the end of the match by handing the referees a list of numbers. These players shall then take one throw each, alternating with their opponents. Each team is free to determine the sequence in which throwers will take their throws
- The goalkeepers may be freely selected from the match report and exchanged in accordance with the Rules of the game. Goalkeepers may take throws and throwers may play as goalkeepers.
- The referees shall choose the goal at which throws are taken. The team taking the first penalty throw shall be determined by the referees by drawing lots. The team winning the draw may choose whether it wishes to throw first or last.
- If scores are equal after the first round of penalty throwing, it shall be continued until a decision is reached. In the second round, the other team shall start. Again five players shall be named who are eligible to play (the players named before may be named once again).
- In the second round, a decision is reached when a goal difference arises after both teams have taken one throw each.
- Eligible players are players entered in the match report who have not been disqualified or suspended at the time of the final whistle.
- Serious infractions committed during penalty throwing shall be sanctioned by disqualification. If a thrower is disqualified or suffers an injury, an eligible substitute player shall be named supplementary.
- While the throws are being taken, only the player taking the throw, the current goalkeeper and the referees may enter the respective half of the playing area.
- If the number of eligible players falls below five, players may be named to take a second throw in the same round.

Preview: Venue is the same and so are two teams

The venue is the same and so are two of the teams
Just like last year, Drammenshallen in Norway is hosting a
qualification group for the Women's EHF Champions League.
Two of the four participating teams, hosts Glassverket and Dutch
champions SERCODAK Dalfsen were also part of the qualification
group last year, but both without reaching the group phase.
This year, they have company by Turkish champions Ankara
Yenimahalle BSK and Croatian titleholders HC Podravka Vegeta.
Only the group winners proceed to the group matches, where they
can look forward to meeting Montenegrin Buducnost, German
Thüringer HC and French Metz Handball.

Glassverket (NOR) vs Ankara Yenimahalle (TUR)

Neither of the two teams, who open the qualification group in Drammenshallen has ever made it to the group phase yet. For both sides, the qualification tournament last year was the closest they ever got so far. Saturday afternoon, at least one of the teams will maintain the hope to proceed to the group stage, though.

"Our team has undergone many changes compared to last year, and we may be in a slightly poorer condition than last year. Still, I think that the ticket for the group phase will be a matter among three teams: Ourselves, Ankara and Podravka," Glassverken coach Geir Ustorp tell ehfCL.com. "Just one look at Ankara's squad shows that they have a strong as well as an experienced team, and there is no doubt that we are going to have our hands full already in this match,

but with the support we will hopefully get from the Drammen crowd, I think we have a chance," he adds.

HC Podravka Vegeta (CRO) vs SERCODAK Dalfsen (NED)

The two teams have at least one thing in common: They both consist entirely of players from their own countries. However, this more or less ends the similarity. While Podravka have a long and proud Champions League history behind them, Dalfsen have never been in the group matches, and if we are to believe Peter Portengen, head coach by the Dutch champions, it is not likely to happen this time either.

"I do not think we will advance to the Champions League. Our opponents are far more experienced than we are, and besides, we have only been able to train together for two weeks after I came back from the Rio Olympics," says Peter Portengen who is working as assistant coach of the Dutch national team beside his job as head coach by Dalfsen. "We will do our absolutely best, of course, and anything can happen in sport, and at least, we can play without pressure," he adds. Podravka's coach Goran Mroden is more optimistic on behalf of his team. "We obviously want to win both our matches and qualify for the Champions League. "I expect our first match against Dalfsen to be an equal game, while the home team, Glassverket is also an interesting team who will undoubtedly be hard to beat on home ground. "Judging by the names of the players, the Turkish team (Ankara) seems to be the strongest of all the teams in qualification group, though, but we will take them as they come, and at the end of the weekend, I expect HC Podravka to continue to the EHF Champions League," says a confident Podravka coach.

Road to the Women's EHF Champions League:

The hosts of the last year's qualification tournament made it to the final of the Norwegian league again, but were not able to offer much resistance in the two-legged final against Larvik, though.

Glassverket had the home advantage in Drammenshallen for the first leg, but Larvik had no trouble winning by no less than 12 goals, 33:21.

This virtually reduced the return match in the Arena Larvik into a formality, but this did not make the Larvik ladies take things easily. 11 goals was the distance after these 60 minutes, which Larvik won 33:22.

- tall keeper with good reactions and already a fine ability to read the shooters.



Mette Leipart left wing

- joined this summer from relegated Nordstrand
- played in Nordstrand her entire handball life before changing for Glassverket
- filling out the gap after Hege Bakken Wahlquist who has left for Danish Cup Winners' Cup champions TTH Holstebro
- fast winger with a varied shooting repertoire
- has signed a two year contract with Glassverket in 2016



Tiril Günter Merg left back

- has played for Glassverket since 2012, when she joined from league rivals Stabæk.
- · versatile and well-shooting back court player
- can play at both ends of the court
- facing some kind of a challenge filling out the gap after Jeannett Kristiansen who has left for Vipers Kristiansand
- studying law at the university of Oslo along with playing handball at top level in Drammen based Glassverket



Emilie Christensen centre back

- playing her third season for Glassverket after joining from 1. Division (second league) club Fana
- with Glassverket, she has got her first league experience and her first time as a professional handball player
- characterised by experts as one of the most talented female players born in Norway in 1993
- still waiting for her chance in Norway's national team, but has played a total of 26 matches for her country in various youth teams



Julie Andenaes line player

- joined this summer from Molde
- has also represented Byåsen, Levanger and Bjørnar during her career
- adds valuable experience to the relatively young Glassverket team
- good at setting screenings and making herself available for passes from her back court players
- solid defender as well



Birna Berg Haraldsdottir right back

- joined in the summer 2016 from IK Sävehof
- versatile back court player with a good shot
- can play equally well at both ends of the court
- has international experience from CL matches with Sävehof as well as a number of internationals for Iceland
- excellent back-up for Line Bjørnsen who may also have to take some court time on the right wing



Line Bjornsen right wing/back

- versatile left handed player who can play the right back as well as the right wing arrived in Glassverket from Stabaek in the summer of 2015
- part of the Norwegian team who took silver at the 2010 Junior WCh, together with her new teammates Emilie Christensen and Hege Bakken Wahlquist
- has played one senior international so far, but no less than 48 internationals in various youth teams
- has to carry some responsibility on the right back after Kristin Nørstebø has left for Vipers

- with Glassverket since 2013
- joined the club after a two-year break from handball, partly due to a foot injury
- has a past career by other Norwegian league clubs Larvik and Flint Tonsberg before her break
- before her league career, she represented the local clubs Konnerud IL and Drammen

Road to the Women's EHF Champions League:

After bringing the trophy back to Koprivnica last term, Podravka Vegeta have defended the Croatian champions title. Goran Mrdjen's investment in youth paid dividends, as Podravka defended the title, despite losing their biggest names to transfers and injuries.

The team took a valiant effort, playing virtually without any backcourt rotation, after Selena Milosevic, Dora Krsnik and Ivana Dezic all succumbed to fatigue-induced injuries at the decisive time in the championship.

However, Mrdjen's team stuck to the home-grown philosophy, as the youngsters brought continuation of success to Koprivnica. Podravka have been able to keep most of the players at the club, which was the driving force behind their 22nd Croatian champions title.

Podravka maintained their reputation of being a hatchery of youth talent, and as their players become stars and leave, the younger generations ensure that success remains in Koprivnica.

Although it was their sixth straight title in the Dutch league, it was something like a sensation that SERCODAK Dalfsen were on top again after the final series against VOC Amsterdam. The face of the team had changed completely, nearly all experienced players had left the club, thus coach Peter Portegem (also assistant coach of the Oranje national team) had to build up a completely new squad.

"We never could expect this, I am so proud on this team," Portegem said after the 24:22 win in the crucial third final.

After a clear 24:31 away defeat, Dalfsen turned the tide first on home ground (21:19) and then again at Amsterdam. It all happened just one month after the club had announced that due to financial reason it will stop with the current season. At the end a cooperation with the Zwolle Football Club saved the future of Dalfsen later.

Road to the Women's EHF Champions League:

It was one of the thoughest seasons in history of the Turkish league as none of the top five teams avoided defeats in the regular season. The Challenge Cup finalists Kastamonu BGSK lost in the quarter-final of the play-off.

Yenimahalle BSK, who were defending the title from last year finished the regular season in fourth place, but in very intensed semi-final matches they prevailed 3:2 against Ardesen GSK, who claimed the national cup for the first time in history at Yenimahalle's expense in return.

Serdar Eler's charges had much lighter work in the final against Muratpasa BSK from Antalya and closed the final series already in three matches (3:0). Yeliz Özel, most valuable player of Turkish handball according to many experts, lifted the trophy with joy and thanked her teammates and her opponents for being part of such a challenging competition.

Preview: From San Sebastian to Europe

One EHF Champions League debutant, the record winners of the competition and two teams with a long international experience will face in San Sebastian on Friday and Saturday for a spot in the group matches.

HC Leipzig (GER) vs. HC Gomel (BLR)

Maybe it is a good omen for HC Leipzig to face Gomel in their semi-final: In the successful 2013/14 and 2014/15 qualifications, the German runners-up proceeded after beating Belarusian champions in their semi-final, in that case, it was Minsk twice. Leipzig had planned to host the qualification tournament, but due to the parallel football Bundesliga match it was impossible. But still the German record champions are confident to at least make it to the final: "We are in a favourite role, but we have strong respect for Gomel," coach Norman Rentsch said. His team (current German cup winner) lost the German Super Cup match against champions Thüringer HC (21:22) last weekend.

While HCL are constant participants on the international stage in all EHF club competitions, HC Gomel will open a new chapter of their history: The match against Leipzig will be their first Champions League game after participating twice in the EHF Cup and once in the former Cup Winners' Cup.

Hypo Niederösterreich (AUT) vs. Super Amara Bera Bera (ESP)

It is a completely new situation for Hypo Niederösterreich: 23 straight times since the start of the Women's EHF Champions League in 1993, the Austrian record champions (40 straight titles) had been seeded directly for the group stage, now the team of new coach Martin Matuschkowitz has to go through the qualification for the very first time. And the hurdle for the four times Champions League winners is high, as hosts Super Amara Bera Bera are superambitious. After two years, when the All-Spanish team of coach Montserrat Puche had become Spanish champions but did not use the right to participate in the Champions League due to financial reasons, a new setup strengthens the club: This week, Bera Bera announced the cooperation with Real Sociedad football club in all terms of management and mutual support. The Bera Bera players will wear Real Sociedad's jerseys during the Champions League qualification tournament, and hope for a lot of football fans to support them. However they will have to fight without their and Spanish national team long-term captain Eli Pinedo who announced her retirement just after the Rio Olympics.

Hypo will arrive at San Sebastian with some new faces in the squad, such as French Audrey Bruneau or Danish line player Christina Haurum. Some of their "old stars" like Marina Budecevic or Gorica Acimovic are still wearing Hypo's jersey. As a start of a new era, Hypo completely changed its branding with a new logo, and new image video and a "fighters' claim". The record winners will know their fate soon, if the 24th group phase berth will be clinched.

Road to the Women's EHF Champions League:

It was the closest race for the trophy in more than a decade and with three rounds before the end four teams - Thüringer HC, Leipzig, Metzingen and Bietigheim - could become champions.

Finally a final of two clubs level on points decided the championship with eventual cup winners Leipzig clearly defeated 31:20 by THC.

The biggest surprise was EHF Cup finalists Metzingen (including season MVP Anna Loerper), playing the by far best season of their history, but lost two crucial matches right before the end, finishing second thanks to their better goal difference compared to Leipzig. As Metzingen decided not to pursue the Champions League ticket via an upgrade request, the right for an additional place passed to HCL, who are coming back to the European top flight after a one-year break.

The team of coach Martin Matuschkowitz took their 40th straight league title in Austria. Since 1976 no other team managed to leave Hypo behind.

This season marked an unwanted piece of history for the champions as the 24:26 defeat in the regular season at eventual final opponent Korneuburg was the first defeat in a league since 22 March 1993, but that counted for nothing when the sides came face to face again in the final.

They won the league 22 times and previously lost the title only once, to Gorodnichanka in 2008. But now, the country has a new champion named HC Gomel. Coached by the Belarus national coach Tomaz Cater since December, this club made a small revolution in the national league.

After the regular season, Gomel had two points less than BNTU-BelAZ, and they lost the first match of the final series. Yet Cater's team did not give up and beat BNTU in the next three games, which was enough to be crowned champions.

Preview: Krim face unpredictable Michalovce

Slovenian RK Krim Mercator will host Qualification tournament 3 in Ljubljana, at Sportna dvorana Kodeljevo. Four teams will fight for the only spot in the group matches to join Group D competitors Larvik, IK Sävehof and Team Esbjerg. The most experienced side hosting the tournament should stand on the front line along the Polish champion Lublin, while luventa Michalovce want to make their dreams come true and make the qualifying cut in sixth attempt. Any underestimation of Indeco Conversano can prove costly for favourites, although it will be very difficult for Italian debutants to spring a surprise at the tournament.

RK Krim Mercator (SLO) vs Iuventa Michalovce (SVK)

Already the first semi-final promises to become one of the highlights of the Qualifying tournament 3 played in Ljubljana. Slovenian runners-up and Champions League winners from 2001 and 2003 are considered the biggest favourites to advance into the group stage, yet they face a strong opponent in team of luventa Michalovce. No Slovakian champion has ever qualified for the group matches and only luventa failed in their all six attempts so far. Krim have lost last season all six group stage games, however strengthened by several arrivals of players, from which French international line player Laura Kamdop from Fleury and Slovenian national team captain Nina Jericek from Nimes stand out. On the other hand, coach Uroš Bregar lost important player and a former inspiring captain in person of Tamara Mavsar. Krim already won the first trophy of the season after beating Zagorje in the Slovenian Super Cup.

Iuventa are described as the most unpredictable side of all four teams. They can beat any of these teams, but so they can lose. Frantisek Urban have lost two important players over the summer. Tatiana Filkova-Trehubova is expecting a baby, whilst Julia Kucerova did not extend the contract. The national team goalkeeper Lucia Gubikova left to Presov. The best Czecho-Slovakian side, winner of WHIL and Slovakian double had solid pre-season with six wins and five defeats. Notably, they won a traditional tournament on home court, meeting likes of Rostov (without Olympians), Lublin, which they can face in this tournament, and Kisvarda. On Wednesday, before turning their attention to Ljubljana, luventa beat Czech champions Banik Most 30:26. Early start of the league can be one of the advantages of the Slovakian side.

MKS Selgros Lublin (POL) vs Indeco Conversano (ITA)

If you are struggling to recall the Italian's club name, do not worry. Conversano will make a debut in the European most prestigious competition on Saturday. On contrary Polish champions are regular contenders in the competition, having played in the group stage last three seasons. Sabina Wlodek girls will hope they can prove their European status, as they did not win a single match last season, similarly to Krim. Lublin got off to a winning start in the league, beating Novy Sacz 28:23 over the weekend. Their preparation matches included likes of luventa Michalovce, also featuring in Ljubljana. "It is a pity this good tournament has not been held later. It was our first serious test, but very useful lesson ahead of Champions League qualification," said Sabina Wlodek. Indeco Conversano are the winners of "La Tripletta" in two years, hat trick consisting of winning league, cup and super cup. It will be their first appearance amongst the European elite.



RK Krim Mercator (SLO)

Road to the Women's EHF Champions League:

There was a surprise in the Slovenian league this season as Zagorje overthrew the powerful Krim after two decades to reign supreme.

The 21-time Slovenian champions Krim, were dethroned after more than two decades, as RK Zagorje defeated RK Brezice to put an end to Krim's hegemony and claim their first domestic title. The young Zagorje team were the more consistent of the two bitter rivals in a heated title

Zagorje also came undefeated in both of their matches against Krim this season, which put an unequivocal claim to the title as early as mid-way through the competition. Since Zagorje decided not to use their right to participate in the EHF Champions League in what would be their maiden season, Krim have filled the spot and registered for yet another season.

Road to the Women's EHF Champions League:

It is the same story in past six years in Slovakian women's handball. Iuventa Michalovce won their ninth title, the sixth in a row. They also won the Slovakian Cup as well as the Czech-Slovakian Interliga.

Michalovce played their arch rivals Slovan Duslo Sala in the final. Sala were the record title holders with nine titles but have been waiting for their tenth for eleven years.

Despite surprising defeat in the second of a possible five matches in the final (23:26) played in Michalovce, the eastern Slovakian team won both away games by nine goals (31:22, 32:23) to be crowned champions for the ninth time. Out of those nine titles, Michalovce celebrated eight of them away from home.

For Michalovce it is their ninth title in thirteen years. They completed golden hat-trick by winning Czech-Slovakian Interliga for the third time in a row, showing their dominance in the region.
