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

Foreword



Dear handball friends,

Welcome to a new season of the Women's EHF Champions League as we mark a very special moment in the history of the men's and women's competitions. Back in 1993/94, the first season of the EHF Champions League was played and this year we will mark the competition's 25th anniversary, looking back on a quarter of a century of sporting highlights.

I would like to welcome the 16 teams from 11 nations to have made it to the group matches phase and congratulate them on joining the elite of European handball on the road to Budapest and the Women's EHF FINAL4 on 12/13 May 2018. Five countries - Denmark, France, Germany, Hungary and Norway are represented by two teams each in the competitions and we have no fewer than five new teams in the competition: Nykøbing Falster Håndboldklub, Brest Handball Bretagne, SG BBM Bietigheim, Vistal Gdynia and Vipers Kristiansand. The defending champions, Györi Audi ETO KC, who won the trophy last May only after an extra-time thriller against HC Vardar, have a tough test ahead of them in Group B. They will meet the reigning EHF Cup champions, Rostov-Don, the emerging French powerhouse

from Brest and FC Midtjylland, the only team to beat the Hungarian champions in both the group stage last season.

Former Midtjylland coach, Helle Thomsen, took over CSM Bucuresti in the summer and with a number of new signings including the star of Romanian handball, Cristina Neagu, the team will be a strong contender in Group A. They join the two-time winners RK Krim Mercator along with Nykøbing and Gdynia. Last season's runners-up, HC Vardar, will face a tough test from the 2011 winners, Larvik, in Group C where they also meet FTC-Rail Cargo Hungaria and Thüringer HC. In Group D, we have four balanced sides: Metz, Bietigheim, Vipers as well as the two-time holders, Buducnost.

The start of the season brings a new development with a fresh look and feel for the competition's official website, ehfCL.com. Now mobile responsive, the new website offers all the latest news and results from both the men's and women's competitions as well as features including comprehensive live statistics thanks to a new agreement with Sportradar.

We pride ourselves on our positive and cooperative relationship with the press and media and I am sure this will continue and develop in the future. Should you require any information, help or assistance during the course of the season, your first point of contact is the EHF Media and Communications Department based in our office in Vienna. They will be more than happy to assist you with any questions you might have.

We look forward to working with you in the upcoming season!



How to follow and cover the matches

ehfTV.com

Handball fans across Europe will not miss a single match in the new season of both elite European club competitions. All matches starting from group phase of the VELUX EHF Champions League and group matches of the Women's EHF Champions League will be broadcast live on ehfTV.com and the videos of all matches will be also on demand. Furthermore, like in the past season fully produced highlights magazine - "Rewind - the handball show" will feature stories and highlights from all women's top matches will be played out after each playing round. Apart from selected matches of other European Cup competitions in the new season there will also be a renewed focus on coverage of top leagues (SEHA League and Spain's Asobal).

Live ticker

The EHF Live Ticker will track the scores of all matches. Every goal, missed shot and yellow card will be documented and live statistics made available online for the first time at this stage of Europe's elite club competition.

EHF Live on social media

The EHF's social media channels will provide a very different view of the chase for the Women's EHF FINAL4 in Budapest. The social media feed with the behind the scenes look will be provided on four channels - EHF Champions League Facebook page, Instagram, @EHF_Live Twitter account and the EHF_Live on Snapchat.

Online match reports

From the opening matches of the season, the complete team line-up is available online at eurohandball.com and available to download as a PDF document. The online solution introudced already in the 2015/16 season sees the EHF match delegate complete the final team line-up immediately after the technical meeting. This development means that team line-ups are available for commentators and reporters hours before each match throws-off. A short time

after each match, a completed match report will also be available online with details such as goal scorers and number of spectators.

All media professionals are invited to register to the EHF Media portal, where they can find all essential information on the EHF club and national teams competitions including media guides and updates.

Regulations of the Women's EHF Champions League

Official name

The official name of the competition is: Women's EHF Champions League. The full name of the competition should always be used. The three letter abbreviation for the European Handball Federation should always be displayed in capital letters before the name of the competition. Please note: If the season is required, it has to be positioned after "Champions League" e.g. Women's EHF Champions League 2016/17. The wording "Champions League" should be written with a capital letter at the beginning of each word, i.e. Champions League. The remaining letters should be in lower case. The word Champions does not have an apostrophe after the 's'.

Important regulations

What decides when two or more teams have the same number of points

All matches of the WOMEN'S EHF Champions League shall be played in 2 x 30 minutes with a half-time break of 15 minutes.

The matches shall be scored as follows:

- a) win = 2 points
- b) draw = 1 point
- c) loss = 0 points

Teams' rankings are obtained by adding up the number of points won.

GROUP MATCHES AND MAIN ROUND

If two or more teams have scored the same number of points, the ranking will be determined as follows:

During the matches of the group:

- a) higher goal difference in all matches;
- b) greater number of plus goals in all matches;

After completion of the group if two teams have scored the same number of points:

- a) number of points in matches of the two teams directly involved:
- b) goal difference in matches of the two teams directly involved;
- c) higher number of goals scored in the away match of the two teams directly involved;
- d) goal difference in all matches of the group;
- e) higher number of plus goals in all matches of the group;

After completion of the group if three or more teams have scored the same number of points:

- a) number of points in matches of all teams directly involved;
- b) goal difference in matches of all teams directly involved;
- c) higher number of plus goals in matches of all teams directly involved;
- d) goal difference in all matches of the group;

teams is determined.

- e) higher number of plus goals in all matches of the group;
- f) higher ranking in Group Matches (Main Round only) g) greater number of points in Group Matches (Main Round only)
- * If the ranking of one of these teams is determined, the criteria are consecutively followed until the ranking of all
- * If no ranking can be determined, a decision shall be obtained by drawing lots. Lots shall be drawn by the EHF, if possible in the presence of team managers.


QUARTER-FINALS

If, after completion of the two matches, both teams have won the same number of points (no extra-time will be played), the teams' standings shall be determined by the following criteria:

- a) goal difference
- b) greater number of plus goals scored in away match c) penalty throws

RULES FOR EXECUTION OF PENALTY THROWS

- Prior to penalty throwing, each team shall name five players eligible to play at the end of the match by handing the referees a list of numbers. These players shall then take one throw each until a decision (a winner) is reached, alternating with their opponents. Each team is free to determine the sequence in which throwers will take their throws
- The goalkeepers may be freely selected from the match report and exchanged in accordance with the Rules of the game. Goalkeepers may take throws and throwers may play as goalkeepers.
- The referees shall choose the goal at which throws are taken. The team taking the first penalty throw shall be determined by the referees by drawing lots. The team winning the draw may choose whether it wishes to throw first or last.
- If scores are equal after the first round of penalty throwing, it shall be continued until a decision is reached. In the second round, the other team shall start. Again five players shall be named who are eligible to play (the players named before may be named once again).
- In the second round, a decision (a winner) is reached when a goal difference arises after both teams have taken one throw each.
- Eligible players are players entered in the match report who have not been disqualified or suspended at the time of the final whistle.
- Serious infractions committed during penalty throwing shall be sanctioned by disqualification. If a thrower is disqualified or suffers an injury, an eligible substitute player shall be named supplementary.
- While the throws are being taken, only the player taking the throw, the current goalkeeper and the referees may enter the respective half of the playing area.
- If the number of eligible players falls below five, players may be named to take a second throw in the same round.

The matches of the upcoming season will be shown live or delayed almost all over the world. Almost 30 TV stations will broadcast matches live or delayed.

Only in Europe fans will be able to watch matches in 18 countries, but also the handball TV audience in America (USA and Canada), Asia and Africa (countries of Middle East and North Africa) can look forward to a television coverage. In all countries without a right-holding TV station matches are streamed live and free on ehfTV.com.

Budapest to welcome the four best teams again

The Women's EHF FINAL4, the showpiece event and final weekend of the Women's EHF Champions League, will stay in Budapest for another two years, bringing top European women's handball to Hungary's capital until 2019.

Back in 2016 EHF Marketing and the Hungarian Handball Federation have agreed to prolong the existing cooperation. It was confirmed that the 2018 edition will take place on 12/13 May in the Papp László Budapest Sportaréna. The arena, which seats up to 12,000 spectators for handball events, will also be the venue of choice in 2019.

The first Women's EHF FINAL4 took place in Budapest in 2014 and was won by Györi Audi ETO KC who beat Buducnost in the final.

But the 2015 edition was won by Montenegrin side which defeated Larvik in the final. In 2016 CSM Bucuresti topped the podium after a stunning success and penalty throw shootout against Györ in the final. The Hungarian champions were forced into another thriller in 2017, but this time around they survived the extra-time and beat Vardar by one goal.

Women's EHF FINAL4 Media Accreditation

The accreditation procedure of media representatives for the Women's EHF FINAL4 will start in March 2018.

Women's EHF FINAL4 facts and figures

- teams have successfully defended their title at the Women's EHF FINAL4 in Budapest – like no men's team have done it at the VELUX EHF FINAL4 in Cologne.
- countries have been represented by more than one team in the three Women's EHF FINAL4 events.
- 1 club Györ have won the Women's EHF FINAL4 twice (2013, 2017).
- 1 club again Györ have appeared in three finals. In 2014 they were unable to make it to the final as they failed to qualify for the FINAL4.
- 1 player Katarina Bulatovic has won the Women's EHF FINAL4 with two different clubs: with Györ in 2014 and with Buducnost in 2015, making her the only player to have successfully defended the title.
- 1 time in 2017 all four participants were identical to the year before: Györ, Vardar, Bucuresti and Buducnost.
- 1 match the 2016 final Bucuresti vs Györ was decided in a penalty shoot-out after extra time, with the happy end for the Romanian side.
- 1 match the 2017 final Györ vs Vardar was decided in extra time, with the happy end for the Hungarian side.

- 2 Champions League debutants made it to Budapest in their first seasons: Vardar (2014) and Bucuresti (2016).
- 2 players only have been sent off through a direct red card in the 16 FINAL4 matches so far, and both are Russian: Dinamo's Olga Akopian in the third-place match in 2015, and Vardar's Tatiana Khmyrova in the semi-final in 2017.
- 2 clubs have been part of all four FINAL4 tournaments so far: Buducnost and Vardar.

2

goalkeepers have been awarded Most Valuable Players of the FINAL4 - and both played for the respective winners: Clara Woltering (Buducnost/2015) and Jelena Grubisic (Bucuresti/2016).

- 3 different countries have won a FINAL4 trophy: Hungary (Györ twice), Montenegro (Buducnost), Romania (Bucuresti).
- 3 times Vardar and Budcnost have played each other in Budapest: twice in the semi-finals (each time won by Buducnost), once in the third-place match (won by Vardar). The only time they did not play each other was in 2017.

3 times the overall Women's EHF Champions League top scorer was a player of the FINAL4 winning team: Anita Görbicz (Györ/2014/87 goals), Cristina Neagu (Buducnost/2015/102 goals) and Isabelle Gullden (Bucuresti/2016/108 goals). The streak ended in 2017 when Vardar's Andrea Penezic was top scorer with 98 goals but her team lost the final.

3

different countries were represented by the coaches at the helm of the four winners: Spain (Ambros Martin/Györ 2014 and 2017), Montenegro (Dragan Adzic/Buducnost/2015) and Denmark (Kim Rasmussen/Bucuresti/2016).

- 3 players scored 10 or more goals in a single FINAL4 match: Nora Mørk (10 for Larvik in the final in 2015), Nycke Groot (11 for Midtjylland in the third-place match in 2014) and Isabelle Gullden (15 for Bucuresti in the final in 2016).
- 4 countries were represented by four referee pairs for the finals: France (Bonaventura/Bonaventura/2014), Hungary (Horvath/Marton, the only male pair so far/2015), Norway (Arntsen/Roen/2016) and Denmark (Christiansen/Hansen/2017).
- 4 times, meaning: each time, Papp Laszlo Arena has been the venue of the Women's EHF FINAL4. In 2016, the contract with the Budapest arena was extended until 2019.
- 6 nations were represented by 2017 winners Györ (Hungary, Norway, Brazil, Netherlands, Czech Republic, Tunisia).
- 7 different clubs from seven different nations have been part of the four Women's EHF FINAL4 events.

- 10 goals was the biggest gap in any Women's EHF FINAL4 match when Buducnost beat Vardar 27:17 in the semi-final in 2015.
- **15** goals by Isabelle Gullden (Bucuresti) are the most goals scored by one player in a single match.
- **16** matches have been played in the Papp Laszlo Arena so far during the four EHF FINAL4 events.
- **20** goals by Nycke Groot (Midtjylland) are the most goals by one player at a FINAL4 event.
- 34 goals by current IHF World Handball Player of the Year, Romanian Cristina Neagu (all for Buducnost), make her the overall top scorer of the Women's EHF FINAL4 so far. Next are Andrea Lekic (Vardar) and Katarina Bulatovic (all for Buducnost) with 24 goals each.
- **41** has been the lowest number of goals in a Women's EHF FINAL4 match since Györ beat Buducnost 21:20 in the semi-final in 2016.

61

has been the highest number of goals in a Women's EHF FINAL4 final so far since Györ beat Vardar 31:30 after extra time in 2017.

- **71** has been the highest number of goals in a Women's EHF FINAL4 match since Vardar beat Bucuresti 38:31 in the semi-final in 2017.
- 224 has been the highest number of goals at a Women's EHF FINAL4 so far at the 2017 edition. There were 210 goals in 2014, 199 in 2015, and 202 in 2016. The record for the men's VELUX EHF FINAL4 is 245 goals.

Review: Vipers ready for first Champions League adventure

A day after defeating Belorusian champions HC Gomel, Vipers Kristiansand cruised into the Women's EHF Champions League Group Matches with a 42:14 win over Croatian champions HC Podravka Vegeta on Sunday, 10 September.

FINAL:

Vipers Kristiansand (NOR) vs HC Podravka Vegeta (CRO) 42:14 (22:6)

Vipers are ready for their first Champions League adventure in history after a convincing performance in the Kristiansand Aquarama. After defeating HC Gomel 43:19 on Saturday, the Norwegian side won even bigger against Podravka in front of 1,648 spectators on Sunday.

The Vipers defence had a solid grip on Podravka's attacking players, and shots were often saved by Katrine Lunde and Eline Fagerheim in the Vipers goal.

This resulted in wave after wave of fast breaks towards the Podravka goal, and in the established

attack, Vipers were effective from all angles and positions, too. The first eight minutes were fairly equal with Vipers only leading by one or two goals, but as the home team increased their advantage from 5:4 to 10:4, the decision already seemed to be on its way.

The last doubt about the outcome vanished as Vipers turned 10:5 into 20:5, and being 16 goals up at half-time, the Norwegian team continued to cruise towards the huge win throughout the second half. In EHF Champions League Group D, Vipers will be meeting Buducnost from Montenegro, Metz Handball from France and debutants Bietigheim, who won the German league title last season.

Review: Thüringer HC grab group matches ticket

After two impressive performances on home court, Thüringer HC deservedly qualified for the group matches of the Women's EHF Champions League 2017/18.c25 hours after their 31:21 semi-final win against the Spanish champions Mecalia Atlético Guardés, THC won the final of Qualification Group 2 against Swedish champions H65 Höörs 33:24.

Thüringer HC enter their seventh straight Champions League Group Matches now; for coach Herbert Müller it is the 10th Champions League season. After Denmark, France and Hungary, Germany is the fourth nation with two teams in the group matches after champions Bietigheim were seeded

FINAL:

Thüringer HC (GER) vs H 65 Höörs HK (SWE) 33:24 (16:9)

They were briefly shaken early in the second half agaist Höörs but in the end they took a clear win. Boosted by more than 1,500 fans, Thüringer HC marched on to the group matches.

"All my players showed an impressive weekend," THC coach Herbert Müller praised his side. "Despite the clear result – which I never expected – it was a tough fight for us. But thanks to a genius performance of Lydia Jakubisova and an extraordinary support

from the stands we are looking forward to great Champions League matches now."

Thanks to a brilliant defence performance and a strong last 10 minutes before the break, Thüringer HC were ahead by seven goals at half-time. Höörs were only close at 6:5 after 19 minutes but a timeout by coach Müller guided the tournament hosts to victory. The long-distance shots of new arrival Anne Hubinger and the wing goals of Jakubisova proved that the left-handed players of THC were on the right track, scoring eight of the 16 THC goals in the first half.

With much more determination and efficiency in attack and a more movable defence, Höör clawed their way back into the match. With 14 minutes left on the clock, Höörs had nearly closed the gap (23:20). But THC didn't fall and despite important saves from Höörs goalkeeper Gry Bergdahl, a treble strike of Aguilar, Huber and Jakubisova made it 31:24 to decide the match.

FACTS AND FIGURES: All you need to know before the start of the Women's EHF Champions League Group Matches.

With the qualification tournaments done and dusted, boarding has been completed for the Women's EHF Champions League 2017/18. Here are the most important facts and figures prior to the start of the group matches, in which 16 teams coming from 11 nations are taking part.

- champions have successfully defended their title since the inauguration of the Women's EHF FINAL4 in 2014. The last team to win twice in a row were Györi Audi ETO, becoming the first FINAL4 winners in 2014 after also winning the last version under the old playing system.
- 1 club can win the EHF Champions League after raising the EHF Cup trophy the previous season: Rostov-Don from Russia.
- 1 more draw is needed until the Women's EHF FINAL4: the draw for the final event. The 12 teams advancing from the group matches will appear in two groups with clubs from Groups A and B, and Groups C and D, respectively. The final standings of the main round determine the quarter-finals.

woman can become the first female winner of the EHF Champions League as a player and as a coach: Irina Dibirova, who won the trophy as a player with Slagelse (2005) and Zvenigorod (2008), and is now coach of Vardar.

- 2 of the 16 participants in the group matches have been part of all four FINAL4 tournaments so far: Buducnost (MNE) and Vardar (MKD). Also, Györ (HUN/3 times), Bucuresti (ROU/2), Midtjylland (DEN/1) and Larvik (NOR/1) have played at the FINAL4.
- 2 teams advanced to the group matches as winners of the qualification tournaments: Kristiansand (NOR) and Thüringer HC (GER).

- 3 teams per group will proceed to the main round. Groups A and B will compose Group 1 of the main round, Groups C and D form Group 2. Group match results against opponents who also advance, will stand in the main round.

- 5 former Women's EHF Champions League top scorers are on court in the 2017/18 group matches: Anita Görbicz (Györ/2014: 87 goals, 2012: 133), Zsuzsanna Tomori (Györ/2013: 95), Cristina Neagu (Bucuresti/2015: 102), Isabelle Gullden (Bucuresti/2016:108), and Andrea Penezic (Vardar/2017: 98 goals).
- 5 teams are making their debut in the group matches: Bietigheim (GER), Gdynia (POL), Kristiansand (NOR), Nykøbing (DEN) and Brest (FRA).
- 5 nations have two teams each in the group matches. Due to the new system and the nations ranking, Hungary and Denmark automatically have two spots. Also, France, Germany and Norway take part with two teams.
- 5 former or current Women's EHF Champions League winners (including all winners since 2011) with a total of 9 titles are part of the 2017/18 group stage: Krim (2001, 2003), Larvik (2011), Buducnost (2012, 2015), Györ (2013, 2014, 2017) and Bucuresti (2016).

- 116 matches (including qualification) will have to be played before we know the winner of the Women's EHF Champions League this season: 8 qualification matches have already taken place, 48 group and main round matches are up next, followed by 8 quarter-finals, and 4 FINAL4 matches.
- **5,748** goals have been scored during the 2016/17 season, an average of 47,9 per match.





CSM SET TO KICKSTART A WINNING CAMPAIGN

With a long term plan and heavy investment, CSM Bucuresti established themselves as of the powerhouses of the Women's EHF Champions League. After becoming the first Romanian side to win the trophy two years ago and reaching the WOMEN'S EHF FINAL4 in Budapest last season, the "tigresses" are looking again at a shot to win it all this year.


If one had the chance to put together a dream team, it would hardly look better than what CSM has lined up on the field for this season. The Romanian side has upgraded in almost every position, especially with Cristina Neagu making her long awaited comeback in Romania. Playing for the first time in her home town, Neagu, who represented Buducnost in the last four seasons, will surely attract a lot of fans in the "Polivalenta" and also make life miserable for the opposing defences.



A 9-meter line with Neagu, Isabelle Gullden and Amanda Kurtovic could be branded as unstoppable, but CSM, who also has other new names, like Nathalie Hagman, Marit Malm Frafjord, Sabina Jacobsen and Aneta Udristoiu needs time to gel. Easier opponents like NFH Nykøbing, Vistal Gdynia and RK Krim Mercator should be what the Romanian powerhouse needs to unleash their full potential in the latter stages of the competition.



The race for the other two qualifying places for the Main Round phase of the Women's EHF Champions League is wide open. While RK Krim Mercator have won the competition two times, both Vistal Gdynia and NFH Nykøbing are rookies. Krim have largely kept their core intact, retaining Bulgarian playmaker Elisabeth Omoregie, who impressed during last season. Tamara Mavsar and Alja Koren are likely to bring their experience to the table, while new transfer Charlotte Adler has impressed in the Women's EHF Cup two seasons ago.





It is Vistal Gdynia's first ever participation in the European top competition, after the Polish side won their second domestic title. With a team made up of 18 Polish players and one Brazilian one, Gdynia's lack of experience at the highest level could prove costly in this group. A Polish team has not progressed from the Group phase in the last 16 seasons, with MKS Montex Lublin being eliminated in the Quarter Final phase.

Celebrating the tenth anniversary of the City Sport Club (CSM) in the Romanian capital, the 2016 Champions League winners have heavily bolstered their squad, with current IHF World Handball Player of the Year Cristina Neagu the star attraction. CSM Bucuresti is a sports club with a number of successful sections alongside handball and the new club president is former middle distance runner and Olympic champion Gabriela Szabo.

When Bucharest made it to Budapest in 2016 as debutants by eliminating the previously unbeaten Rostov-Don, it was a major surprise, but the surprises did not end there. Thanks to a historic performance from playmaker Bella Gullden, CSM beat Györ to take the trophy after the one and only penalty shootout in a Women's EHF Champions League Final, a feat which the club hope to repeat this season.

"We have the best CSM squad ever," says team captain Oana Manea. Mainly thanks to the transfer of Cristina Neagu the hopes and dreams in Romania are larger than ever. The chances are good, but Györ, Rostov and Vardar have the same objective. "You cannot lower the bar, when you have won this competition once," says manager Nicolae Luca.

CSM needed three coaches last season to make it to Budapest, but already before interim solution Per Eriksson was signed, Bucuresti had announced the arrival of Dane Helle Thomsen for 2017/18. Previously, she had coached FC Midtjylland and the Swedish team in parallel, so she has the experience to cope with the situation she is currently in, also coaching a world class Dutch national team. Thomsen brought her former Swedish players Nathalie Hagman and Sabrina Jacobsen to Bucharest, who both arrive from Denmark.

Norwegian world and EURO champions Amanda Kurtovic and Marit Malm Frafjord, also 2012 Olympic champion, will also add significant class to the attack. The Scandinavian style of play will continue with Thomsen at the helm and these players should fit in nicely. But no other player will have to deal with the weight of expectation Cristina Neagu will feel this season.

Nykøbing Falster HB



After their very first appearance in an international competition, where they made it straight to the EHF Cup 2016/17 Semi-finals, Nykøbing Falster Håndboldklub became Danish champions for the first time. Now, they make their maiden voyage in the EHF Champions League – with two sisters, an almost all-Scandinavian squad and a new coach.

Despite the burden of playing the Danish league in parallel with Europe's premier club competition, there is more joy than pressure for Nykøbing: "For us, being part of the Champions League so early is a big sensation," says club manager Henrik Hansen. The fans in Power Arena were truly frenetic when NFH played their debut season in the EHF Cup 2016/17, so they will climb the ladder together with team and the club.

Nine players and coach Niels Agesen left (to Randers), eight new players and coach Jakob Larsen arrived, so it will be a tough job to put all the pieces of the puzzle together. But the start of the season has been quite positive, as NFH beat the big favourites from Odense in the Danish league, before a close defeat to domestic runners-up Midtiylland.

A team that beats the likes of former CL finalists Lada Togliatti (Russia) or EHF Cup finalists TuS Metzingen (Germany), then defeats former European cup winners FC Midtjylland in the finals of the Danish league, seems to have enough international class. Additionally, thanks to the EHF Cup 2016/17 season, NFH know what a tough group phase feels like.

Kristina Kristiansen is one of the best-known Danish handball players on and off the court – and she feels home at Nykøbing now. Some weeks ago, Kristina Kristiansen (nicknamed 'Mulle') extended her contract at NFH until 2022, when she will be 33 years old. Kristiansen played at Holstebro before and won the EHF Cup twice, in 2012/13 and 2014/15.

They have won the Women's EHF Champions League twice, and four years ago Krim reached the semi-final. However, since then a major transition has happened. Young coach Uroš Bregar rejuvenated the squad and, after a surprisingly strong group phase last season, the Slovenian side hope for a longer and better season this time around.

They were the biggest surprise of last season's group phase, as they made it through to the main round with six points thanks to two victories against Larvik. They went on to lose all their main round matches, but they gained respect. "Our goal is to make steps forward. We proved that we are on the right track. We hope that we will be able to fulfil our primary goals in domestic and international competitions and to walk an additional mile towards our long term goal," says Tina Kravanja, Krim's Secretary General. The group phase matches against Gdynia and Nykøbing will be an indication of what the future holds.

Krim are not used to facing teams of equal quality in the Slovenian league, so the Champions League is their main competition. However, the plan of Krim to develop young, hungry talent works well when they are allowed to focus on one competition. "To be a part of the Champions League, is a big honour for us," says Kravanja.

Jelena Despotovic and Tamara Mavsar are the biggest names to join Krim, but that is balanced against Vesna Milanović Litre and Laura Kamdop leaving. The team is expected to be on the same level as last season. "We have a young and ambitious team, which wants to prove the improvement. We want to stand up against strong teams and get stronger," says team captain Miša Marinček.

After one season at Vardar, when the team unluckily lost the Champions League final against Györ, Tamara Mavsar returns to Krim, where she had been playing since she was 17. The left wing learnt a lot at Skopje, and is expected to be one of the best strikers in the Ljubljana-based team.

Vistal Gdynia



Last season Vistal Gdynia became Polish champions for the second time in their history, and now for the first time they will be part of the EHF Champions League Group Phase. The main goal for the nearly all-Polish squad will be to gain experience at the highest level.

Nykøbing are making their EHF Champions League debut and Bucuresti are at this stage for only the third time, although the Romanian side have won the Champions League already. Only Krim provide experienced opposition for Gdynia, having more than 20 appearances in this competition. All this means that Gdynia are not that far behind two of the three teams in terms of experience. However, last year Krim showed that their transition is already successful and Nykøbing were strong in the EHF Cup 2016/17, so the Polish champions are clearly below the rest in terms of (international) experience.

"Our opponents are very strong and have great experience in the Champions League. We want to present the best version of ourselves, gain experience and snatch some points," says Gdynia manager Krystian Gańcza. "We hope that this Champions League experience will pay off in future, because we have a very young team," he added. In general, the chances to make it to the main round seem to be limited, but Krim showed last season that a young team are able surprise the favourites when they get into a flow.

The left-handed Polish international transferred to Germany, joining 2016 EHF Cup semi-finalists TusSies Metzingen. Alicja Pekala is the only new arrival for Gdynia, and the right wing will take some responsibility in the right back position too.

She replaces Paweł Tetelewski as Gdynia coach this season. Truszyńska played most of her career in Gdansk and made more than 110 appearances for the Polish national team. In 2008, the 46-year-old started her coaching career.

Group B preview



GROUP WITH TWO CURRENT EUROPEAN TITLE HOLDERS

Just like a year ago, Györi Audi ETO KC, FC Midtjylland and Rostov-Don were drawn into the same group of the EHF Champions League. Together with the ambitious debutant Brest Bretagne Handball, they again formed a very strong and competitive quartet. It features two current European title holders - Györ enter the competition as its winner, and Rostov, who had an unsuccessful campaign at the continental top flight last autumn, went on to win the EHF Cup.

Last season, Györ once again proved to be an absolute European powerhouse. For the third time in five years, the Hungarian team grabbed the most prestigious continental trophy. Previously they had managed it during the two successive years (2013 and 2014) — and now definitely hope to repeat the trick. In summer, the team coached by Ambros Martin lost the veteran line player Heidi Løke who came back to her home country Norway and now plays for Storhamar IL. However, Györ made up for this loss by signing another 35-year-old, Anja Althaus from Vardar, who notably scored six goals against the Hungarian team in the Champions League final last season.



Rostov were so much disappointed by the setback in the European top flight last season that they fired the head coach Jan Leslie midway through the season. And with his successor Frederic Bougeant, the Russian team redeemed themselves by winning the EHF Cup as well as the national league. Now the star-studded Rostov set their goals high in the Champions League. To strengthen the squad, they brought in a number of quality players including the famous Katarina Bulatovic from Buducnost as well as 2016 Olympic Champion Marina Sudakova and Brazilian goalkeeper Mayssa Pessoa. The latter is a replacement for the veteran Katrine Lunde who opted to move to Vipers Kristiansand in her home country Norway.



Midtjylland did not win any international trophies last season, yet their EHF Champions League campaign was quite a success. The Danish team survived not just in the group phase – where they notably beat both Györ and Rostov at home - but also in the Main Round and fought hard against the future finalist Vardar in the quarter-final. In summer, the club parted ways with a number of key players such as Sweden's Sabina Jacobsen who moved to CSM Bucuresti as well as the Danish internationals Stine Jorgensen and Trine Ostergaard Jensen who were lured by domestic rivals HC Odense. At the same time, eight new players joined the team, and now the head coach Kristian Kristensen needs to integrate them as soon as possible.



Brest are the least experienced team in Group B, yet the French do not hide their ambitions. After a successful debut in the EHF Cup last season, where they reached the quarter-final, the team of Laurent Bezeau aim to advance to the main round in their maiden EHF Champions League campaign.

No club has yet to win the Women's EHF FINAL4 two years in a row, but defending champions Györ have put themselves in a strong position to change that with their summer transfer activity.

After signing players such as Stine Oftedal and Anja Althaus, Hungarian powerhouse look primed to challenge for their fourth title. In 2014, when the event premiered at Papp Laszlo Sportrena in Budapest, Györ were the first winners and defended their 2013 title, which they had won in the old format of two finals against Larvik. It is safe to say Györ belong to the top contenders again this season and they expect nothing less than gold.

Goalkeeper Kari Aalvik Grimsbö, left back Zsuzsanna Tomori and playmaker Nycke Groot underwent surgeries over the summer and while Tomori is already back training with the team, Groot and Grimsbö are expected to return by the time the group matches begin.

Anja Althaus had said farewell to elite handball after losing the 2017 final with HC Vardar, ready to move on to the next chapter in her life, until a phone call changed everything. The 35-year-old German line player received an offer from Györ to reconsider her retirement and she admitted: "This is a challenge I could not say no to. To play for Györ was my dream since I began to play handball," added the two-time EHF Champions League winner (2009, 2010 with Viborg).

With a quick integration of the new players, Györ's target for the season is clear.

"We want to defend our position among the best women's club teams, to be part of the FINAL4 and to repeat the success of last season," says club president Csaba Bartha, adding: "We know our group matches opponents, such as EHF Cup winners Rostov, very well, we are expecting very tough matches against them, but we are already looking forward to the pleasure of taking part in the competition."

They started as one of the main contenders to win the Women's EHF Champions League in 2016/17, but the dream was over after the group phase.

With Frederic Bougeant as their new coach, Rostov-Don restarted in the EHF Cup, won the trophy, finished the Russian Super League season undefeated – and are now eager to make it to the winners' podium again.

For the 2016/17 group phase, they were drawn into the 'group of death' with the two 2016 finalists: Györ and Bucuresti, plus Danish side FC Midtjylland. Despite having one of the best squads in the competition, Rostov failed to qualify for the main round, with one possible reason being that their Russian Olympians had run out of power. Now, everybody at Rostov-Don is sure and confident that they learned their lesson the hard way — and they have the chance to take revenge against Györ and Midtjylland in the group phase this season.

It is hard for any team to replace world class goalkeeper Katrine Lunde, but Rostov found a former world champion: Brazilian Mayssa Pessoa, from Vardar. Aside from Pessoa's arrival, Katarina Bulatovic carries a lot of hope to strengthen the right side of the attack together with Anna Vyakhireva, while fellow new arrival Marina Sudakova was part of the Olympic gold medalist team. Thus, the squad looks even stronger than in the previous years.

Two seasons ago, they won all 12 matches in the group phase and main round, before they were eliminated by the team that went on to become champions, CSM Bucuresti, in the quarter-final. Rostov have therefore already been close to the final destination. This season, the goal of reaching the FINAL4 is a realistic one. Aside from Györ, Vardar and Bucuresti, Rostov have the strongest squad in the competition on paper.

If you look at the two current Women's EHF Champions League players who can win their fifth trophy this season, Bulatovic seems to have the better base for it.

Just like the Montenegrin back, Norwegian (and former Rostov) goalkeeper Katrine Lunde has won the Champions League four times, but with her new club, Kristiansand, it would be a real surprise if she makes it to Budapest.

They will play two familiar faces and a debutant – and again FC Midtjylland are starting with the hope of at least making it to the main round. "We are in the group of death this season again," says team captain Veronica Kristiansen.

In the group matches of the 2016/17 season, FCM eliminated big favourites Rostov Don. This season, they will face the Russians again. And they will have the chance of beating Györ again, what the Danish runners-up managed last season, too. The quarter-finals against eventual finalists Vardar were the end of the road. Another quarter-final berth is the big dream of the former EHF Cup and Cup Winners' Cup champions.

As former team captain and defence boss Sabrina Jacobsen has joined several fellow Swedish players at CSM Bucuresti, Midtjylland will have to change the middle block. With experienced Dane Trine Troelsen and tall Norwegian Tonje Löseth, two strong defenders have come to FCM and are supposed to form the middle block with Swedish line player Linn Blohm.

Two FCM top players - Stine Jørgensen and Trine Østergaard - have joined the team of former national team coach Jan Pytlick, and the first duel in the Danish league ended in a 24:17 defeat for Midtjylland. Like champions Nyköbing, FCM are supposed to be the hunter, not the hunted this season. But having tough competition in the domestic league can strengthen a squad for the Champions League.

The Norwegian left back Veronica Kristiansen, EHF EURO winner in 2014 and 2016 and world champion in 2015 - will carry a huge responsibility as new team captain, succeeding Sabrina Jacobsen. The 27-year-old Kristiansen arrived two years ago from Glassverket and continues a long history of Norwegian top players at Ikast, like for example Gro Hammerseng-Edin or Katja Nyberg.

Brest Bretagne Handball



After a successful maiden voyage in the previous EHF Cup season, Brest Bretagne are set for their debut in the Women's EHF Champions League. With the centre back position brilliantly composed of Allison Pineau and Marta Mangue, the French runners-up are aiming for the main round.

Facing defending champions Györ, EHF Cup winners Rostov-Don and Women's EHF FINAL4 2013 participants Midtjylland, Brest were drawn in an experienced and tough group for their debut season. However, finishing second in the French league for the first time and a run to the EHF Cup Quarter-finals leaves no doubt this side is ready for Europe's top flight. Rostov-Don ended their hopes last season, so revenge is on the cards against the Russian side when they meet in the opening round on 7 October.

"It is an honour to be part of the Champions League for the first time, which was one of our long-term goals," says coach Laurent Bezeau, adding: "It is important for us to participate because we want to offer the best possible show, with the best teams and the best players in the world, to our fans. "It is also essential for the success of our economic and sporting project to permanently have high-level handball in our arena."

The home matches and the away match at Ikast will be crucial for the French runners-up, as Rostov and Györ are formidable opponents. Typically for French sides, the defence will be the cornerstone of success, backing up the impressive attack.

Two Swedish newcomers - goalkeeper Filippa Idehn (Esbjerg) and left wing Louise Sand (Sävehof) have experience at this level and were part of the bronze medal-winning Swedish national team at EHF EURO 2014. Besides being a brilliant keeper, Idehn is famous for playing in shorts, while Sand is exceptionally efficient in counter attacks.

The team also possesses arguably the best playmaker duo in the competition. Allison Pineau was World Handball Player of the Year 2009 and both her and Marta Mangue have been named in several All-star teams at major tournaments. They are classic playmakers but can also shoot from distance and take on defenders.

VARDAR SET TO LAUNCH ANOTHER TITLE BID FROM TOUGH GROUP

Having failed to win Europe's premier club competition in four successive FINAL4 appearances, Macedonian pride HC Vardar are poised for another shot at glory. However, they first have to win as many points as they can in a tough preliminary group including former champions Larvik and the unpredictable FTC-Rail Cargo Hungaria.

A heart-breaking 31:30 defeat by Györi Audi ETO in last season's spectacular final will undoubtedly still be on Vardar's minds when they meet FTC Rail cargo Hungaria at home in next season's opener.

It was the closest the Macedonian giants came to winning Europe's elite club competition and the narrow miss was all the more disappointing after the men's team won their maiden Champions League title on the back of spectacular VELUX EHF FINAL4 wins against FC Barcelona and PSG Handball.

In a bid to reach the showpiece event for a fifth time in a row and possibly break the jinx, Vardar have reinforced their already star-studded roster by signing towering Serbian line player Dragana Cvijic. With her compatriot Andrea Lekic and Croatian Andrea Penezic still leading an impressive back-court, Vardar should have little trouble in getting through to the main round.

However, winning maximum points for the second group stage of the competition may not be plain sailing, with former champions Larvik, FTC Rail Cargo Hungaria and Thüringer all capable of staging an upset on their day.

With Vardar clear favourites to win the group, the latter three sides are expected to slug it out for the two remaining main round berths. Larvik, who were knocked out in the quarter-finals in the last two seasons after reaching the FINAL4 in 2015, will again rely on their lethal winger Linn-Kristin Koren Riegelhuth to lead the charge.

With some of their ageing stalwarts making way for upcoming young talents, notably after the retirement of Gro Hammerseng-Edin and her spouse Anja, Larvik will not be among the favourites in the 2017/18 competition. In fact, they can expect a bumpy ride in the group matches as they face a tight three-way battle with FTC and Thüringer for a pair of main round berths.

The Hungarian side have kept a largely unchanged squad, having added Laura van der Heijden from Team Esbjerg while several fringe players have left the club. Thüringer had to come through a qualification tournament, having finished ahead of unfancied Swedes H 65 Höörs HK, the once mighty Hypo Niederösterreich and Spain's Mecalia Atletico Guardes, but will certainly wish to avoid crashing out in the next stage. A main round appearance would emulate Thüringer's achievement in the previous two seasons and that will certainly be the minimum requirement as the German side were last eliminated in the group matches in 2012/13.

After Vardar's men's team became Champions League winners last season, and the women's team were finalists, the Vardar women will be hoping to go all the way this time. But they know that the climb is steep, despite the addition of a new line player who knows exactly what is needed to win the competition.


Vardar's men's team won the VELUX EHF Champions League last season, while the Kometal Gjorce Petrov Skopje women's team took the trophy in 2002, thus, Skopje is the only city in the world of handball with Champions League winners in both genders. The man behind Vardar's current success is Russian club owner Sergey Samsonenko. He announced that he would leave the club after this season.

"We have six new players and four of them are Macedonians. This is very good for the team and country," says manager Ana Stojkov. Vardar want to encourage more Macedonian kids to play handball, with the success of their men's and women's teams. "We want to promote handball in Macedonia and we want to promote Macedonia in Europe", said Stojkov.

"The objective for this season is to play in the final of the FINAL 4 and to make that one extra step forward," stated Vardar's new team captain, Montenegrin wing Jovanka Radicevic. For Vardar, playing in group C means that they will have manageable opponents in the group phase (Larvik, THC and FTC) and that they will avoid the other big names such as Györ, Bucuresti or Rostov in the main round.

But one of those powerhouses is a potential opponent in the quarter-finals. In general, the squad seems to be prepared to make it to Budapest - but as all know, anything can happen, once you are there. A lot will depend on how coach Irina Dibirova prepares the team for tough tests, as their domestic league is relatively weak. Dibirova will also receive a vital help from her new assistant Jose Garcia Parrondo, who only recently played in the VELUX EHF Champions League.

The powerful Serbian Dragana Cvijic has won the EHF Champions League twice already, in 2012 and 2015, with her former club Buducnost. Now it is her dream to repeat this feat with Vardar. Cvijic is hard to stop when she has the ball, and she will be trying hard to replace Anja Althaus.

In 2011, Larvik were Champions League winners. Later on they made it to the finals twice – but now that most of their previous top stars either have left or retired, a completely new team takes the challenge to improve on international ground.

Except in the 2008/09 season, the Norwegian record champions have always been among the best eight teams of the Women's EHF Champions league – regardless of the playing system. This season, it will be a steep climb to make it that far again, as save for Linka Riegelhuth-Koren nearly all the club's experienced players have said goodbye to Larvik HK.

"We have a brand-new team this season. We are young and hungry, and we are very excited to start. We need the experience that the Champions League will give us with this new version of Larvik. We can bring on some upsets with this young and talent filled team," hopes new team captain Thea Mørk.

Mainly Riegelhuth-Koren, Thea Mørk or new arrival Cassandra Tollbring. But it will be really hard to replace the armada of top stars such as Marit Malm Frafjord (who has joined CSM Bucharest), Amanda Kurtovic (CSM Bucharest), Sanna Solberg (Team Esbjerg), Sandra Toft (Team Esbjerg), Alina Wojtas (Zaglebie Lubin) or the retired trio Gro Hammerseng-Edin, Karoline Dyhre Breivang and Anja Hammerseng-Edin.

Since the first experience, when a huge number of Brazilian players joined Hypo Niederösterreich, the number of players from the 2013 World Champions' country in European top clubs has constantly increased. After goalkeeper Gabriela Goncalves joined Larvik in the 2016/17 season – and now will fight for the No.1 position with Guro Rundbraten after the departure of Sandra Toft - her compatriot Tamires Morena (from Dijon) is among the new arrivals. The Rio-born line player made her first steps in Europe at Györ, where she played in the 2014/15 season.

A 2.0. version of Larvik HK started its mission this season. "We need to collect international experience as a team, as some of our players individually have this experience already," says head coach Tor Odvar Moen, who expects a tough group.

FTC-Rail Cargo Hungaria dream of playing the Women's EHF FINAL4 in their home city Budapest, but despite the signing of Dutch shooter Laura van der Hejden, they are realistic enough to set their goal as the quarter-finals. "Vardar are outstandingly good, but the other teams are equally strong, this is the most balanced group," says FTC Executive Director László Bognár.

While FTC's squad did not change that much, Larvik lost several top players, while Vardar and Thüringer HC bolstered their line-ups. On paper, the Hungarian runners-up have a good chance to finish second in the group behind the Macedonian champions.

No team has a shorter distance to the final destination of the Women's EHF Champions League, as the Papp Laszlo Arena in Budapest is just around the corner for FTC. But the route feels longer than last year with Györ, Bucharest, Vardar and Rostov the main contenders to reach final tournament, while strong newcomers such as Brest, Bietigheim and Nykøbing may also be knocking on the door.

For FTC, everything depends on the luck of the quarter-final draw, but they have to get there first.

After learning her trade at German side VfL Oldenburg, the Dutch left back had made her next step by joining Danish side Esbierg, where she had her first experience at this level last season. Now she joins national teammate Dannick Snelder, who arrived one year ago. Van der Hejden was the top scorer of the 2010 Junior World Championship and has progressed to the senior national team, winning silver at EHF EURO 2016.

"For our team this is a great challenge and it is an honour to play in the Champions League," says Bognár. Team captain Klára Szekeres is confident of belonging among the top eight teams, but admits: "At Champions League level we will face only strong teams and we need to do our best."

After missing the German league title to the unbeaten SG BBM Bietigheim, Thüringer HC needed to go through the Spanish and Swedish champions in the Champions League qualification tournament to get into the competition. Herbert Müller's team are now facing their seventh straight Women's EHF Champions League season, and they will be hoping for at least a main round berth.

Fellow Group C teams Larvik, FTC and Vardar have been THC's opponents in previous seasons, so they know them well. Although Larvik's squad will be fully rejuvenated, Vardar and FTC have significantly bolstered their line-ups from last season. Thus, it seems that the matches with the Norwegian side will decide the crucial third spot in this group.

THC's home court in Bad Langensalza does not meet all the EHF's requirements, so Thüringer HC have found a second home for their Champions League matches, 80 kilometres away at Nordhausen. Despite the distance, THC's fans seem to love this arena, and have showed up to their matches to build up a "red wall" of support.

So, playing at a different arena will likely have no negative effect on THC.

The addition of three German internationals from HC Leipzig Saskia Lang, Anne Hubinger and Alexandra Mazzucco will clearly bolster THC – this was proven during their successful Champions League qualification tournament. Lang's experience, Hubinger' shooting and Mazzucco's speed provide Thüringer HC with many more options in attack, while Lang and Hubinger are also strong defenders. All three of these players had to leave HC Leipzig due to the club's bankruptcy.

Since the 2013/14 season, Thüringer HC have consistently made it to at least the main round, and this is what they hope for again this season: "We are extremely happy that we proceeded from qualification. Now we have hard but also interesting group matches ahead. I am sure this is the best ever THC squad, so we truly hope to proceed to the main round," says coach Herbert Müller. "If you once made it to the Champions League, you will feel the hunger to return every year. So we are again hungry for top matches," adds team captain Kerstin Wohlbold.

A FORMER CHAMPION, A DARK HORSE AND TWO DEBUTANTS

Buducnost team under reconstruction, French champions in progress and two completely new teams are going to compete for the main round tickets. Buducnost are the only team in Group D who have won the Women's EHF Champions League in the past, while French champions Metz Handball will try to copy and perhaps improve their quarter-final berth from last season, when Group D launches on the 7 and 8 October.

However, both teams will get heavy competition from debutants Beitigheim and Vipers. Buducnost were drawn from Pot 1, which was only natural, considering that the Montegrin club won the Champions League in 2012 and 2015 and have been at all the past Women's EHF FINAL4s.

However, it will be a Buducnost team under reconstruction who will be entering the group matches this season. Big names like Cristina Neagu, Katarina Bulatovic and Dragana Cvijis and others have left, and young talents have had to take over.

"We are by far the youngest team in the Champions League," head coach Dragan Adzic claimed. Last season, Metz Handball reached the quarter-final for the first time in their Champions League history, and the French champions even managed to put later champions Györ Audi ETO KC under pressure in those quarter-finals.

Metz actually won the first leg at home 32:31 before losing 28:22 in Györ. Having regained the title in France, Metz will be eager to copy that achievement or maybe do even better and reach the FINAL4 this season. "We are breaking new land," stated SG BBM Bietigheim coach Martin Albertsen. He is right, as his team, who won the German championship for the first time last season, are completely new to the Champions League after reaching the final of the EHF Cup in their maiden season in Europe last year.

A question is how big a handicap the absence of pregnant Dutch playmaker Maura Visser will be to the team. Just like Bietigheim, Vipers Kristiansand are Champions League debutants, and unlike the German champions who qualified directly for the group matches, the team from Norway's fifth largest city had to go through qualifiers to reach the group matches.

These qualifiers meant no big challenge to last season's runners-up in Norway, though. On home ground, Vipers won 43:19 against Belarusian champions HC Gomel before defeating Croatian title-holders HC Podravka Vegeta 42:14.

"There is no doubt that we will meet much tougher resistance from now on, though," left wing Vilde Jonassen predicted.

With almost all of Buducnost's golden generation gone and replaced by talented young guns, the ambitions of the 2012 and 2015 champions have been toned down. However, there are players in Dragan Adzic's squad capable of making an immediate impression.

Although the squad overhaul began a couple of years ago, the effects will be definitely be felt this season after three top stars left over the summer: World Handball Player of 2016 Cristina Neagu (Bucharest), Katarina Bulatovic (Rostov) and Dragana Cvijic (Vardar) – and the weakening of Podgorica strengthened their biggest rivals.

It is the job of coach Dragan Adzic to create a completely new team with Montenegro's next generation, building towards national team success at the 2020 Olympics in Tokyo. "We will give our young players the opportunity to gain experience and to present themselves on the European stage.

"Given that, this is a very promising players, we hope that they will build the opportunity to play as many matches in the Champions League", says manager Marijana Bulatovic. "Buducnost come from one of the smallest country in Europe, but in this competition we have left our mark as one of the biggest countries in Europe. Therefore, the EHF Champions League is very important for our club, our nation and our supporters," Bulatovic says. Being drawn in a group with Metz, Bieitigheim and Kristiansand, the inexperienced side are not in a hopeless situation.

Team captain Milena Raicevic, one of the last survivors of the squad which reached its peak in 2012, is the new leader of the squad. Goalkeepers Darly Zoqbi De Paula will and Marta Batinovic will have to shoulder a lot of responsibility, while Djurdjina Jaukovic proved last season she is among the most capable of the new generation.

Will she be the new Neagu? This is the question asked about Cristina Laslo in Romanian and Montenegrin handball circles. After her role model became a star in Podgorica, the young playmaker has all the skills to follow in her footsteps.

Metz Handball needed 17 Champions League participations to clinch their first quarter-final berth last season. Now the French record champions are hungry for more. A major change in their squad occurred on the line-player position where French Olympic silver medallist Laurisa Landre replaced Serbian World Championship silver medallist Sladjana Pop-Lazic.

The French champions have enjoyed a favourable draw. In the group matches they are expected to be among the three best teams, and if they proceed, they will avoid playing top favourites Rostov, Györ and Bucuresti prior to the quarter-finals. So reaching the quarter-finals again seems manageable, "If possible we even want to go further, to the FINAL4," says coach Emmanuel Mayonnade.

Brest with an impressive squad, Issy with some big names, Nice with top new arrivals, Nantes and Besancon with strong international seasons recently - the French women's league has constantly improved in the previous seasons. Therefore, it is anything but easy for Metz to fight for their third straight and 22nd overall French title. But this strong competition can boost them.

Ana Gros (81 goals), Grace Zaadi (49) and Xenia Smits (48) were Metz best scorers by far in the previous Champions League season. Gros is one of Europe's best right backs and Smits has grown constantly after her arrival from Germany. So, in combination with playmaker Zaadi, they can carry the hopes but the defence will be the key.

It is not by incident that Laura Glauser is the central point of the official EHF EURO 2018 poster. In the last two years she was stepping out of the shadows of Amandine Leynaud, the regular France No. 1 between the posts. While winning Olympic silver at the Rio Games, Glauser had the highest saving percentage of all goalkeepers. With another season on an international high, the 23-year-old, five-time French champion can play an even more important role for Metz and the national team.

Although they are newcomers in the Women's EHF Champions League, on the back of their very first league title in Germany, Bietigheim can count on a team with players who know how to perform at this level and a Danish coach who knows this competition well.

"It was a dream came true for us, when we qualified for the EHF Champions League," said Bietigheim's manager Gerrit Winnen and 2016/17 was indeed a dream season. In their first Europe campaign, SG went all the way to the finals of the EHF Cup, eventually losing to Rostov, beating some big names such as Kuban and ÉRD in the process.

Now they face manageable tasks en route to the main round; a Buducnost side in a state of transition, Kristiansand are fellow newcomers and Metz a team they beat in pre-season. "We are hoping for a surprise and to make it to the main round. For us it is a pleasure to play against these clubs full of tradition, fantastic home courts and fans," says team captain Kim Naidzinavicius.

Coach Martin Albertsen has plenty of experience at this level to draw on, after leading Leipzig, Randers and Viborg into and through the competition in past years. As for players, Nina and Susann Müller, Dutch stars Wester, Malestein and Visser as well as the Danish sisters Fie and Cecilie Woller will be key figures.

The Polish playmaker Karolina Kudlacz-Gloc, who had been at Leipzig for more than a decade, will return at the end of the group matches, following the birth of her son in June. The former IHF World Handball Player of the Year nominee could play a huge part for Bietigheim, but will need some time to adapt.

All eyes will be on the performances of Wester, who was part of the 2015 World Championship All-star team and enters her first season in Europe's elite club competition. Despite her young age, she is already a key player in the club and national team. Wester will build a new partnership between the posts with former Leipzig goalkeeper Nicole Roth and Azerbaijani Valentyna Salamakha.

Vipers Kristiansand



They are on their maiden voyage in the EHF Champions League, but they can count on some truly experienced players. Vipers Kristiansand are not your typical debutants; they are hoping for a main round berth and to dethrone Larvik in the domestic competitions. Almost all Vipers' squad are Norwegian, save for the Danish Mathilde Kristensen.

Players such as the Lunde sisters or Linn Sulland have been stalwarts of the Norwegian national team for years, and some younger players such as Emily Artnzen have also proved their abilities already in the national team. The only open question is whether Kristiansand can cope with the heavy programme of Champions League and Norwegian league, as they have never before competed in the group phase.

Just by looking at qualification results, the Kristianstand attack is outstanding. The Vipers scored 85 goals in two matches against Gomel and Podravka - and showed their hunger for goals until the final buzzer. But the defence can be a key too, mainly in group matches against the strongholds of Buducnost and Metz, where the number of goals conceded could be more important.

At 22, Malin Aune is the youngest member of the Norwegian national team. The right wing made her debut with the senior national team in 2015 after winning medals in younger age categories – bronze at the Women's 17 EHF EURO 2011 and Youth World Championship in 2012. Aune was part of the team that raised the EHF EURO 2016 trophy in Sweden and is playing her first EHF Champions League season in 2017/18 with debutants Vipers Kristiansand. Aune had an important role in Vipers' successful Champions League qualification, scoring 14 goals in two matches. Now, the new arrival from Oppsal is supposed to become a key player for the future.

Manager Terje Marcussen and team captain Kari Brattset have the same ambition in their maiden Champions League voyage - to make it to the main round. But their group with Metz, Bietigheim and Buducnost is not that easy, especially if you are not used playing a group phase.






History: 24 years of EHF Champions League

1993 - 2005

1993/94

Hypo Niederösterreich vs Vasas Budapest 20:18 / 25:21 (45:39)

New name, new playing system, but well-known finalists – just as in the men's competition the Champions League replaced the Champions Cup from the 1993/94 season. 32 teams played two K.O. rounds for the eight places in the Champions League. The two finalists were the winners of the two groups of four. Hypo Niederösterreich became the first title holder showing a spotless performance with 12 victories from 12 matches.

1994/95

Hypo Niederösterreich vs Podravka Koprivnica 14:17 / 26:19 (40:36)

After 20 victories in 20 Champions League matches, Hypo Niederösterreich was beaten for the first time in the first leg of the final in Koprivnica. But the 14:17 in Croatia was followed by a clear 26:19 victory in the second leg and the cup remained in Austria.

1995/96

Podravka Koprivnica vs Hypo Niederösterreich 13:17 / 25:20 (38:37)

In the 1995/96 season Austrian side Hypo Niederösterreich "only" finished second and that created tremendous joy for the Eastern Croatians. Under the leadership of the old and new top scorer, Snežana Petika, Podravka Koprivnica for the first time took the crown of the greatest club competition.

1996/97

Mar Valencia vs Viborg HK 35:26 / 23:24 (58:50)

In 1997 there was a whole new constellation in the final. Mar Valencia, who had narrowly lost three times in the Champions League Group Phase, celebrated a Spanish fiesta. The team, which was based around the excellent Natalia Morskova, was the first Spanish team in the history of the competition to reach the final. The opponent was Viborg – the first Danish finalist since Copenhagen in 1966 (ed. IHF competition).

1997/98

Hypo Niederösterreich vs Mar El Osito L'Eliana 28:21 / 28:26 (56:47)

Mar El Osito L'Eliana had reached the final by scoring at least 31 goals per match. They failed to repeat this feat when they needed it most. Hypo Niederösterreich triumphed with two victories, earning their third Champions League title.

1998/99

Dunaferr SE vs Krim Electa Ljubljana 25:23 / 26:26 (51:49)

Two new faces appeared in the Champions League final in the 1998/99 season. In the semi-finals Dunaferr had beaten defending champion Hypo Nlederösterreich while Ljubljana narrowly held the upper hand over Podgorica. In the final it was the Hungarian side that prevailed, winning their first Champions League title.



1999/00

Hypo Niederösterreich vs Kometal Skopje 32:23 / 20:22 (52:45)

The final of the 1999/00 is less likely to be remembered for Hypo's fourth title in just four years but more for the violent disruptions caused during the final by Macedonian fans. In the second leg objects had been thrown onto the court for almost the entire match, and the problems reached a climax when everyone fled into the changing rooms and Hypo manager Gunnar Prokop was attacked.

2000/01

Viborg HK A/S vs RK Krim N. Roberts Ljubljana 22:22 / 19:25 (41:47)

After suffering defeat in the 1999 finals against Dunaferr, the time was finally ripe in 2001 for Krim, Slovenia's most dominating club whose focus had always been to win the Champions League. In the final Krim prevailed over Viborg thanks to win and a draw.

2001/02

FTC HERZ Budapest vs Kometal D. P. Skopje 27:25 / 22:26 (49:51)

On 19 May 2002, 45,000 fans people celebrated their heroines enthusiastically in the main square of the Macedonian capital — a great achievement had been made: Kometal Skopje wore the crown of Europe's top club competition for the first time. Two years before, the Macedonians had played in the finals against Hypo Niederösterreich but after rioting fans during the second leg in Skopje all Macedonian clubs were banned for one year from the European Cup, and no one had expected Macedonian handball to recover that fast from the shock.

2002/03

El Osito Valencia vs Krim N. Roberts Ljubljana 30:27 / 28:36 (58:63)

For the third time in a row, the Champions
League winner came from former Yugoslavia
and for the second time after 2001 Krim
Ljubljana was sitting on the European throne.
Skopje had won the title in 2002. There was
also another record: goalkeeper Luminita Dinu
won the European title for the third time in a
row.

2003/04

Slagelse DT vs Krim Ljubljana 25:24 / 36:32 (61:56)

In less than four years world class player and world class coach Anja Andersen had led Danish side Slagelse DT out of the second division and straight into their first Champions League season. And just one year after they had already celebrated the win of the EHF Cup, the team was victorious once more – this time in Europe's most prestigious club handball competition. It was a fairy tale come true.

2004/05

Slagelse DT vs Kometal D.P. Skopje 27:23 / 27:20 (54:43)

For the second time in the history of the Champions League and after the double victory of Hypo Niederösterreich in 1994 and 1995, a team was able to defend its title. In all twelve Champions League matches, from the Group Phase to the final, coach Anja Andersen's team suffered only one defeat.



History: 24 years of EHF Champions League

2005 - 2017

2005/06

Krim Ljubljana vs Viborg HK A/S 22:24 / 21:20 (43:44)

In the history of the Women's EHF Champions League that had not happened before. In both final matches of the 2005/06 season the away teams won. It seemed a mere formality for Viborg to lift the trophy following their 24:22 win in Slovenia, but Ljubljana fought back and had one hand on the cup when they led 20:17 in the 52nd minute before running out of steam.

2006/07

Slagelse DT vs Lada Togliatti 29:29 / 32:24 (61:53)

It was Slagelse's third go at gold and they did it convincingly. With elite performances both in the Champions League and the Danish league, where they did not lose one single point, Anja Andersen's women were the favourites for the title – so another success of the "dream team" was not a surprise.

2007/08

Zvezda Zvenigorod vs Hypo Niederösterreich 25:24 / 31:29 (56:53)

After having beaten Hypo Niederösterreich at home 25:24, the Russian champions were also triumphant in Wiener Neustadt in a very tough second leg. For Hypo it was a big disappointment as everything had been prepared for party at the Arena Nova to celebrated then ninth title since 1989.

2008/09

Viborg HK vs Győri AUDI ETO KC 24:26 / 26:23 (50:49)

Viborg HK won the Champions League for the

second time after having lost the first leg of the final 24:26 but winning the second leg 26:23 against Györ. Viborg's Grit Jurack contributed four goals in the second match and became the Champions League's top scorer with 113 goals in the 2008/09 season.

2009/10

Viborg HK vs Oltchim Rm. Vâlcea 28:21 / 32:31 (60:52)

Viborg HK defeated Oltchim Vâlcea to win the Women's EHF Champions League for the second consecutive time and the third time in the last five years. Also the Danish dominance continued. Since 2003/2004 all Champions League titles had gone to Danish teams, except for the 2007/2008 season when Russian team Zvezda Zvenigorod celebrated the victory.

2010/11

Larvik vs Itxako Reyno De Navarra 23:21 / 24:25 (47:46)

In a real nail-biting thriller right until the dying seconds, Itxako defeated Larvik by a single goal in the second leg of the final, but with the aggregate score, the Norwegians were the lucky winners of this clash and brought home the EHF Champions League trophy for the first time in the club's history.

2011/12

Győri AUDI ETO KC vs Budoćnost 29:27 / 25:27 (54:54)

Budućnost won the tightest edition of the EHF Women's Champions League by account of scoring the greater number of away goals (27 in Hungary) than Győri AUDI ETO KC (25 in Montenegro). It was only a small consolation for Györ's Anita Görbicz who picked up the top scorer for the 2011/12 season.



2012/13

Larvik HK vs Győri AUDI ETO KC 21:24 / 22:23 (43:47)

After losing the finals in 2009 and 2012 Győr finally ended their curse of seven European Cup finals without a trophy. The coronation of the new queens of European handball took place in jam-packed Veszprém Aréna after the second leg victory and carried on in the streets of the city of Győr. The Hungarian team were dominant throughout the whole season as they suffered only one defeat (in the semi-final at home vs Oltchim) in 16 matches.

2013/14

Buducnost vs Győri AUDI ETO KC 21:27 (10:15)

For the first time in history just one final game decided about the new title holders as Papp Laszlo Budapest Sportarena hosted the excellent premiere edition of the MVM EHF FINAL4. Györ successfully defended the title after avenging their 2012 defeat by Buducnost in front of a sold-out crowd (10,000). Hungarian champions were the only undefeated team of the season as they won 12 matches and drew twice with Buducnost in the main round. Györ's captain Anita Görbicz became the season's top scorer for the second time scoring 87 goals.

2014/15

Larvik vs Buducnost 22:26 (8:14)

After defending champions Györi Audi ETO KC had been hit by a series of injuries and maternity leaves it became as no major surprise as they were eliminated in the quarter-finals by Vardar. The Macedonian champions had to settle with the third place finish for the second straight time though, after stumbling upon Buducnost once again in the semi-final. In the final showdown of the two previously unbeaten teams in Budapest the Montengrin side cruised

past Larvik to their second European crown. Andrea Penezic and Cristina Neagu shared the top scorer's title with each scoring 102 goals.

2015/16

CSM Bucuresti vs Györi Audi ETO KC 29:26 after penalty shootout (25:25, 13:12)

The Romanian newcomers were all but impressive before the final rounds of the main round and only a few people would expect they could stand a chance against another Champions League debutants Rostov-Don in the guarter-finals. However the team of Kim Rasmussen not only eliminated the previously unbeaten Russian team after two narrow wins but also ousted Vardar in the semi-final and completely stunned handball Europe by defeating Györi Audi ETO KC despite the fact the Hungarian favourites played with support of a sold-out crowd (12.000) of the Papp Laszlo Arena behind them. Unstoppable Isabelle Gullden netted in 15 goals in the final and Aurelia Bradeanu scored the deciding penalty in the shoot-out for CSM.

2016/17

Györi Audi ETO KC vs HC Vardar 31:30 after extra-time (26:26, 15:12)

The sold-out Papp Laszlo Budapest Sportarena wittnessed a very similar and thrilling scenario like the year before as the final went to the extra-time. Vardar, who ousted the defending champions CSM Bucuresti in the semi-final, climbed back from a three-goal deficit, but mainly courtesy of a stellar performance of Anita Görbicz Györ were able to snatch a narrow victory and their third title in five years.
